Organ donation surgery needs to happen quickly after a patient has died in order to give the donated organs the best chance of success for the recipient. However the matching of the organs to the right patient or patients can take time.

Once the donated organs have been removed, they are carefully transported to hospitals around the UK, ready to be transplanted into the selected recipients.

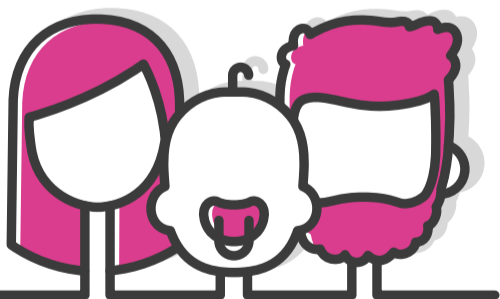
These patients are given another chance at life that they wouldn't have had without the generosity of the donor and their family.

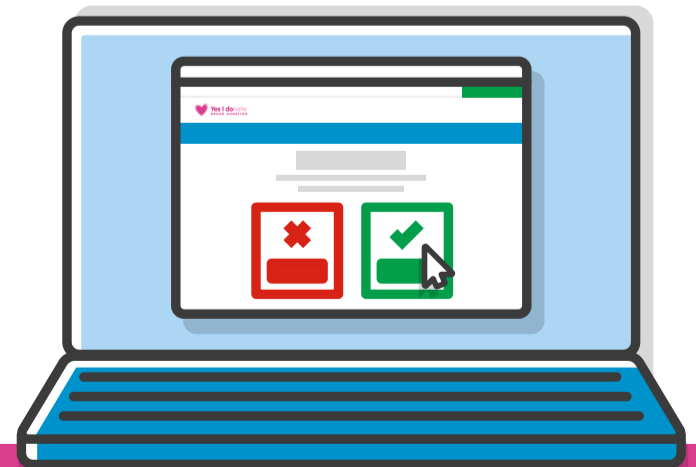


Many transplant recipients go on to lead a life that would not have been possible without a transplant.
