Taking Organ Transplantation to 2020

In 2017/18, from 39 consented donors the Trust facilitated 28 actual solid organ donors resulting in 76 patients receiving a life-saving or life-changing transplant.

In addition to the 28 proceeding donors there were 11 additional consented donors that did not proceed.


Best quality of care in organ donation

Referral of potential deceased organ donors

Goal: Every patient who meets the referral criteria should be identified and referred to NHS Blood and Transplant's Organ Donation Service

Aim: There should be no purple on the chart

Aim: The Trust (marked with a cross) should fall within Bronze, Silver, or Gold



The Trust referred 98 potential organ donors during 2017/18. There were 20 occasions where potential organ donors were not referred.

When compared with UK performance, the Trust was below average (amber) for referral of potential organ donors to NHS Blood and Transplant.




Presence of Specialist Nurse for Organ Donation

Goal: A Specialist Nurse for Organ Donation (SNOD) should be present during every organ donation discussion with families

Aim: There should be no purple on the chart

Aim: The Trust (marked with a cross) should fall within Bronze, Silver, or Gold



A SNOD was present for 44 organ donation discussions with families during 2017/18. There were 12 occasions where a SNOD was not present.

When compared with UK performance, the Trust was below average (amber) for SNOD presence when approaching families to discuss organ donation.

Why it matters

- If suitable patients are not referred, the patient's decision to be an organ donor is not honoured or the family does not get the chance to support organ donation.
- The consent rate in the UK is much higher when a SNOD is present.
- The number of patients receiving a life-saving or life-changing solid organ transplant in the UK is increasing but patients are still dying while waiting.
