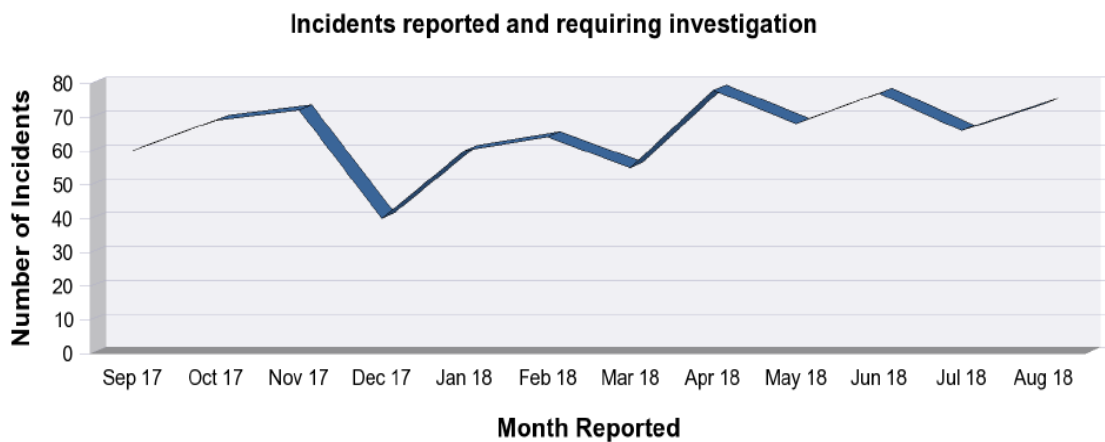

**4. Learning from reports**

Below is a summary of the findings and learning from key clinical governance reports submitted to ODT between 1<sup>st</sup> April 2018 – 30<sup>th</sup> Sept 2018:

**Date reported: 31<sup>st</sup> August 2018**

<b>What was reported</b>	It was reported that there was confusion on the night around whether the forearm sentinel skin flap being taken from a multi-organ donor was to support transplantation or research. There is a recognised research project where these flaps are taken along with the pancreas, but the donor hospital was not one of the sites
<b>Investigation findings</b>	We concluded that the sentinel skin flap was retrieved to support transplantation of the small bowel, as a matter of routine and hence there should have been no concerns. The skin flap was however retrieved uneventfully.

Learning
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This is still under investigation however it has been ascertained that this process has been in place for some time and has highlighted that SNOD training in respect of aspects of small bowel retrieval requires review.
