Supporting you: The role of the advisor

How advisors can help with monitoring, speaking at events and provide cultural insights into what works.

- To provide advice to project leads as required
- To participate in promotional events, where possible
- To encourage cross pollination and sharing best practices amongst funded projects.
- To monitor and review the progress of projects with project leads biweekly or monthly.
- To provide support and advice on overcoming any highlighted issues.



Real Life Stories – Donor Ambassador Programme

- How sharing real-life stories can bring your project to life and help to engage your audience.
- NHSBT Organ Donation Ambassador programme and the speakers you hear today demonstrate the power of sharing real life stories.
- We have more than 60 donor family members, transplant recipients and their family members, living donors, and healthcare professionals who are trained as Ambassadors.
- Currently virtual. Ambassadors are geographically based in the Midlands, London, and Northern, North West, and Yorkshire regions of England.





NHS Blood and Transplant

Engaging Volunteers – Starting Tips

- Role Description what will you be asking your volunteers to do (define clear and specific expectations)
- Recruitment who are the best messengers to reach our audience? Where can you find them/how can you reach them? (Keep in mind their availability)
- Train and Empower to ensure accurate messaging, provide training on organ donation and campaign basics, your project, role expectations, and resources available to them
- Engage communicate regularly with the volunteers and help them to continue to know what is expected of them and the role they play in your project
- Celebrate Success and acknowledge their contribution
- Ask for feedback and be ready to course correct

Other tips



- For volunteers with a personal story, respect boundaries and the limits of what they are willing to do or share
- Share best practice and consider pairing a more experienced speaker or volunteer with newer volunteers, or consider a shadowing process
- Complete health and safety risk assessment and consider the potential vulnerability of your volunteers



Request a Speaker



- Request an Organ Donation Ambassador by emailing
 <u>Ambassadors.ODT@nhsbt.nhs.uk</u> with the date of the event so we can prioritise. A speaker request form will be sent to you for completion. We ask for 4 weeks notice to give us time to find an appropriate speaker. (Digital request form coming soon)
- To arrange blood donors, sickle cell patients and NHSBT blood donation speakers, email <u>community.funding@nhsbt.nhs.uk</u> clearly stating the speaker requirement, date event, and details about the event / what is needed from the speaker. We will need at least 4 weeks notices and will do our best to fulfil.
- Direct questions about volunteer recruitment, empowerment, or engagement to <u>Community.Funding@nhsbt.nhs.uk</u>. Team will respond or collate FAQs. If further support or advisement is needed, we will arrange it.



The impact of organ donation: a personal perspective



Jay and Sina Patel

Jay and Sina Patel are parents of baby boy, Aari Jay Patel, who sadly died on 23 November 2016. Aari was able to donate to seven people who were in need of his help via organ donation.

Jay and Sina Patel were named Exceptional Volunteers in the UK Awards for Excellence in Organ Donation and Transplantation, launched by NHS Blood and Transplant and the British Transplant Society to celebrate outstanding professionals and volunteers.

They have since lent their support to several campaigns, events and initiatives aimed at encouraging people to talk about organ donation, both in the London area and on a national level.
