Anthony studied Philosophy at the University of Leeds, receiving a PhD in 2001. He has 20 years' experience in teaching ethics at undergraduate and postgraduate level at Keele University, which includes 10 years specialist focus on biomedical and research ethics. He has also provided training in research ethics to the NHS and higher education institutions. In 2018 Anthony became full Professor of Ethics at Keele and his major research topics include questions on the margins of life (reproductive and end of life ethics), personhood, concepts in bioethics (the nature of disease, illness and vulnerability), moral authority and autonomy and the nature of expertise in ethics. He also has a strong interest in how the fundamental concepts used in health care, such as harm, authority, vulnerability, hope and trust are understood. As well as experience of sitting on and chairing committees, he has engaged with a diverse range of individuals across multiple areas, including healthcare and professionals with relevant interests.
