

# **University Hospitals Birmingham NHS Foundation Trust**

#### Taking Organ Transplantation to 2020

In 2020/21, from 34 consented donors the Trust facilitated 25 actual solid organ donors resulting in 70 patients receiving a life-saving or life-changing transplant. Data obtained from the UK Transplant Registry.

In addition to the 25 proceeding donors there were 9 consented donors that did not proceed.

#### Best quality of care in organ donation



### Referral of potential deceased organ donors

Goal: Every patient who meets the referral criteria should be identified and referred to NHS Blood and Transplant's Organ Donation Service

Aim: There should be no purple on the chart

Aim: The Trust (marked with a cross) should fall within Bronze, Silver, or Gold



The Trust referred 104 potential organ donors during 2020/21. There were 25 occasions where potential organ donors were not referred.




### **Presence of Specialist Nurse for Organ Donation**

Goal: A Specialist Nurse for Organ Donation (SNOD) should be present during every organ donation discussion with families

Aim: There should be no purple on the chart

Aim: The Trust (marked with a cross) should fall within Bronze, Silver, or Gold



A SNOD was present for 51 organ donation discussions with families during 2020/21. There were 9 occasions where a SNOD was not present.

## Why it matters

- If suitable patients are not referred, the patient's decision to be an organ donor is not honoured or the family does not get the chance to support organ donation.
- The consent rate in the UK is much higher when a SNOD is present.
- The number of patients receiving a life-saving or life-changing solid organ transplant in the UK is increasing but patients are still dying while waiting.
