Taking Organ Transplantation to 2020

In 2021/22, from 21 consented donors the Trust facilitated 11 actual solid organ donors resulting in 21 patients receiving a life-saving or life-changing transplant. Data obtained from the UK Transplant Registry.

In addition to the 11 proceeding donors there were 10 consented donors that did not proceed.

Best quality of care in organ donation



Referral of potential deceased organ donors

Goal: Every patient who meets the referral criteria should be identified and referred to NHS Blood and Transplant's Organ Donation Service

Aim: There should be no purple on the chart

Aim: The Trust (marked with a cross) should fall within Bronze, Silver, or Gold



The Trust referred 63 potential organ donors during 2021/22. There were 12 occasions where potential organ donors were not referred.




Presence of Specialist Nurse for Organ Donation

Goal: A Specialist Nurse for Organ Donation (SNOD) should be present during every organ donation discussion with families

Aim: There should be no purple on the chart

Aim: The Trust (marked with a cross) should fall within Bronze, Silver, or Gold



A SNOD was present for 26 organ donation discussions with families during 2021/22. There was 1 occasion where a SNOD was not present.

Why it matters

- If suitable patients are not referred, the patient's decision to be an organ donor is not honoured or the family does not get the chance to support organ donation.
- The consent rate in the UK is much higher when a SNOD is present.
- The number of patients receiving a life-saving or life-changing solid organ transplant in the UK is increasing but patients are still dying while waiting.

DCD - Imminent death anticipated and treatment withdrawn with no absolute contraindications to solid organ donation
