# GROUP 2 AND NON-UK RESIDENT EU GROUP 1 PATIENT TRANSPLANTS

#### BACKGROUND

This paper reports on intestinal transplants performed in the UK involving NHS Group 2
patients and NHS Group 1 non-UK resident EU patients between 1 October 2023 and
31 March 2024.

#### **METHODS**

 Data on all Group 2 patients and all Group 1 non-UK resident EU patients who received an intestinal transplant in the UK between 1 October 2023 and 31 March 2024 were obtained from the UK Transplant Registry (UKTR) as recorded on 12 May 2024. Data was also obtained on all registrations between 1 April 2023 and 31 March 2024.

# **RESULTS**

#### Registrations

- 3. There were twenty-nine Group 1 registrations and two Group 2 registrations between 1 April 2023 and 31 March 2024. The two Group 2 registrations were for the same patient who received a transplant in March 2024.
- 4. Of the twenty-nine Group 1 registrations, 3 were Group 1 non-UK resident EU patients, with their permanent countries of residence as the Republic of Ireland for two patients and Denmark for one patient.

### **Group 2 patients**

5. There was one Group 2 patient intestinal transplant performed in the UK between 1 October 2023 and 31 March 2024 and Table 1 (removed as patient identifiable) contains details regarding the recipient and donor. The liver was accepted for a superurgent liver only patient and all compatible Group 1 intestinal only patients on the matching were offered and declined prior to the bowel being accepted for the group 2 recipient.

## **Group 1 non-UK resident EU patients**

6. There was one Group 1 non-UK resident EU patient intestinal transplant performed in the UK between 1 October 2023 and 31 March 2024 and **Table 1 (removed as patient identifiable)** contains details regarding the recipient and donor. The liver was accepted for a super-urgent liver only patient and there were 5 compatible Group 1 patients on the liver and intestinal matching run who didn't require a liver, all at Cambridge. The named patient offer was initially declined on donor virology but the patient was reconsidered due to logistical issues with a second patient.
