Speaker, Chair and Panel Member Bio's

Derek Manas

Professor Manas graduated from the University of Witwatersrand in Johannesburg, South Africa, in 1980 and completed his surgical training at Groote Schuur Hospital in Cape Town. He subsequently completed fellowships at Johns Hopkins University (Baltimore, USA), and Paul-Brousse Hospital (Paris). In 1993, he was the recipient of the CJ Adams/Sandoz Traveling Fellowship to the UK. In 1994, he joined the Newcastle upon Tyne NHS trust (Freeman Hospital) as consultant in hepatobiliary and transplantation surgery. He became Director of Transplantation in 1998 and in 2007, attained a personal chair in Transplantation at Newcastle University. He was instrumental in developing three super-regionally funded transplant programmes (for liver, pancreas and pancreatic islets) in the Northeast of England. He established a number of regional cancers services (HPB and abdominal sarcomas) as well as establishing 'The Northern Intestinal Failure Service'. He founded the first integrated Institute of Transplantation in the UK, which he led as Director, for 10 years. In addition to being a past president of the British Transplantation Society (BTS), he has also been past Chair of the British Liver Transplant Group (BLTG), chair and founder of the BTS Transplant surgeon's chapter, deputy chair of the Liver Advisory Group and deputy chair of the HPB/Medicine CRG. He was Associate medical director for Governance at OTDT and is the current Medical Director of NHSBT (OTDT). He is a member of many national and international societies and a National Institute for Clinical Excellence (NICE) technology adviser. He has an extensive research portfolio with many research interests including novel markers for early detection of hepatocellular (HCC) and cholangiocarcinoma, ablation techniques for treating liver tumours, liver transplantation for cancer, radio-embolization in the management of HCC and colorectal liver metastases and irreversible electroporation (IRE) for the treatment of pancreatic carcinoma. He has published over 300 peer review publications, eight book chapters, and co-edited two books on liver tumours. He is a regular reviewer for numerous journals.



Jonathan Brotherton

Jonathan joined Heart of England Foundation Trust (HEFT) in September 2014, as Director of Operations and was appointed to the Board of Directors in March 2015. When UHB and HEFT merged in April 2018, Jonathan became the Chief Operating Officer (COO) for Good Hope, Heartlands and Solihull hospitals.

On 1 April 2019, he was appointed COO for the whole Trust and was responsible for the day-to-day running of its four hospitals, Birmingham Chest Clinic, Solihull Community Services and a number of 'satellite' units. In addition to holding the COO role, Jonathan was appointed as Deputy Chief Executive in February 2022, and became Interim Chief Executive in January 2023.

In July 2023 Jonathan was appointed as the Trust's Group Chief Executive.

Jonathan joined the NHS in 1992 as a trainee paramedic in Worcestershire, working clinically for 12 years, before moving into management full time. He graduated from the University of Worcester with a Masters' degree in Management Studies in 2007 and has worked in senior leadership roles in a number of acute hospital trusts, regional ambulance services and the National Intensive Support Team.

She subsequently trained in Interventional Bronchoscopy in Heidelberg in Germany before moving to the UK to complete a Clinical Fellowship in Lung Transplantation. In 2017 she was appointed a Consultant in Respiratory and Transplant Medicine at the Queen Elizabeth Hospital in Birmingham before moving to Harefield in 2019. Alongside her clinical role she also serving as the National Lung Lead for Organ Utilisation within NHS Blood and Transplant.

David van Dellen

David van Dellen, the Pancreas lead CLU, is Clinical Director for Nephrology & Transplantation at the Manchester Royal Infirmary and a consultant Transplant and General Surgeon. He has active roles in the renal and pancreas transplantation programmes and delivered the first simultaneous islet and kidney transplant in the UK. He is one of 3 consultants providing the national EPS service from Manchester, the largest service in Europe accepting worldwide referrals. He also provides a tertiary abdominal wall reconstruction service.

He is also currently Head of School for Surgery for NHS England North West and a member of the Specialist Advisory Committee (SAC) for General Surgery as CESR lead.

He has several peer reviewed publications and active research interests in organ donor management, pancreatic transplantation, risk assessment in transplantation, the pathogenesis and surgical management of EPS, and abdominal wall reconstruction. He currently supervises MRC fellows and has numerous grants in transplantation and abdominal wall reconstruction.
